Corporate Reading Guide:

Read the other Gospel's accounts of Jesus encounter with Pilate and the crowds. Notice how little Jesus says or does – all while accomplishing the atonement. (Matthew 27:1-31; Luke 23:1-25; John 18:28-19:16).

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What impacted you and/or what did you learn from our study of Mark this week?
- 2. What impacted you and/or what did you learn about the Gospel? What did you learn about <u>God</u>'s character, <u>Man</u>'s sinfulness and need, <u>Christ</u>'s atonement and how He meets our need, or God's call on us to <u>Respond</u>?
- 3. When you think of traitor who comes to mind (real or fictional) and what was their motive?
- 4. Read Mark 15:1-5. Share a time when you, like Pilate, betrayed Jesus to protect your image, and what you learned from that experience.
- 5. Read Mark 15:6-15. What ideals and false messiahs like Barabbas are we as believers most likely to choose over Jesus?
- 6. Read Mark 15:16-25. We don't like comparing ourselves to the soldiers... But in what ways have we used Jesus to make ourselves feel strong, superior, or successful?
- 7. Read Mark 15:26 and Philippians 2:5-11. How does the inevitability of Christ's glorious exclamation and exultation give us hope as we serve Him imperfectly?
